We are also pleased to announce that the band "Ole Tar River" will also be on site playing some old timey music that was heard during the mid-1800's.

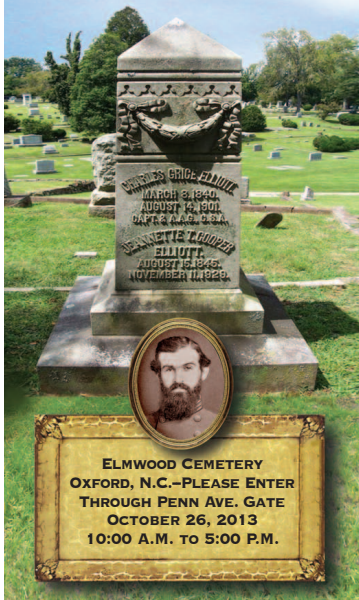

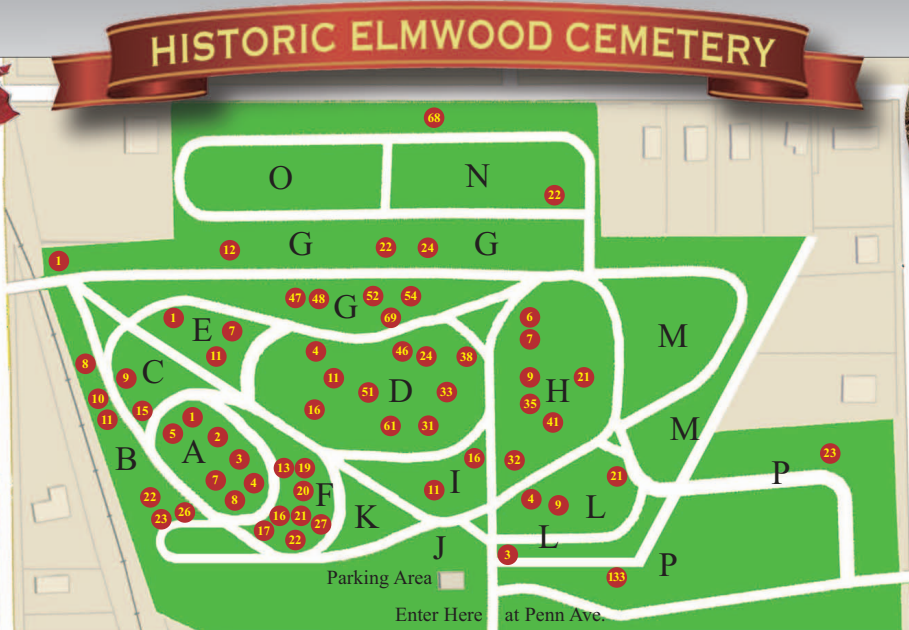
NOTE: Please enter the Cemetery through the Penn Avenue gate, as the main gate will be closed to traffic.

JOSIAH PENDER

JOSIAH PENDER (1819–1864) built the Atlantic Hotel and later, without official permission, led the Beaufort Harbor Guards to take over Fort Macon on April 14, 1861. After being relieved of his duty by Governor John Ellis, Pender volunteered to join the Tenth North Carolina State Troops and was commissioned as captain of Company G. After he deserted to tend to his sick wife, who died in 1861, he was dishonorably discharged and became part of a blockade running operation, smuggling goods into the port of Wilmington for the Confederate cause. In 1862 he married his cousin Laura Pender. Josiah Pender died of yellow fever and was buried in the Old Burying Ground in Beaufort.





INGREDIENTS

3 cups water

2 family-size tea bags

3/4 cup sugar

7 cups cold water

PREPARATION

- 1. Bring 3 cups water to a boil in a saucepan;
add tea bags.**

Boil 1 minute; remove from heat.

Cover and steep 10 minutes.

- 2. Discard tea bags.**

Add sugar, stirring until dissolved.

**Pour into a 1-gal. container,
and add 7 cups cold water.**

Serve over ice.
