Commander's Comments

Hello Camp 2205 members, family, and friends. I write this column this month to you in mixed spirits. I, along with other camp members am recently back from standing up for my hero, a true Christian southern gentleman Robert Edward Lee. As many of you are aware, our beloved flags have once again been considered racist flags, and attacked again. There were a few (6) law students of the Washington and Lee University whom formed their own "committee" as they call it, and demanded the University President take the Battle flags out of the Chapel on campus because they were "offended". Now for those of you who don't know, this Chapel is where the remains of General Lee and his family rest. The Yankee president Kenneth Ruscio announced that the flags would be removed from the chapel on July 8th. The Stonewall Brigade of the Virginia Division of the SCV organized a Heritage rally in Lexington VA on Saturday, July 26th. We had arrived fairly early on that day, and stood beside my Tarheel brothers who were the first boots on the ground. While there were around 300 people in attendance, that number was very

disappointing. We should have had 3,000 descendants there. While we all realize that sometimes people cannot make every event, this was one event that everyone should have tried to make. After all, if we won't stand up for General Lee, then who will we stand up for? Folks, it clearly states in the Charge that this is OUR DUTY. While I am in no way trying to "tick" off anyone in our camp or the SCV, we all simply need to ask ourselves if we are living the Charge to the best of our ability. General Lee was a man of very strong faith, and loyalty to his duty, and we all should be following in the example he set for us. In a lot of ways, I see some comparison today of our duty and faith. While we want to be Christians and to do our duty, we mostly do not. Sure we are good people, but are we honoring our oaths to the Lord? And are we honoring our oaths to our Confederate ancestors?
